One regularly assessed criteria is a strong and consistent GPA. Many scholarships require at least a 3.0 or even a 3.5. If the award is a renewable amount that's paid out annually, as opposed to a one-time award, you could require that the student maintain a certain GPA annually while or risk forfeiting any future funds.

Sample Documents for Scholarship Funds

Scholarships must be awarded on a nondiscriminatory basis to grantees, and the objective procedures used in the process must be confirmed to gain IRS approval. The IRS also requires the organization to choose grantees who are most likely to succeed at the funded activity and to supervise the scholarship recipients to determine if obligations have been met.
